**LEGAL WORKSHOP ON THE KEY IMPLICATIONS
OF
THE NATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT:
INTEGRATED COASTAL MANAGEMENT ACT 24 OF 2008**

Most of the provisions of the National Environmental Management: Integrated Coastal Management Act 24 of 2008 (NEM:ICMA) came into operation on 1 December 2009.

This Act creates a coastal zone for the Republic of South Africa and it establishes new and innovative regulatory instruments to provide for the co-ordinated and integrated management of the coastal zone by all spheres of government in accordance with the principles of co-operative governance.

The Act has significant legal implications for land-based coastal activities (e.g. coastal development, access to the coastal zone and the release of effluent) and marine-based coastal activities (e.g. dumping at sea). The Act also has direct inter-relationships with the Environmental Impact Assessment regime, the environmental duty of care in terms of section 28 of the National Environmental Management Act 107 of 1998, and development planning legislation. In addition, the Act has far-reaching legal implications for various stakeholders.

NEM:ICMA is currently in force and it has now become essential for "potentially affected" stakeholders to understand the main legal implications of the provisions of this Act for their respective activities and businesses.

Who should attend?

The workshop is designed for public and private sector representatives who want to acquire a clear and in-depth understanding of the potential legal implications of NEM:ICMA for their respective activities and responsibilities.

Considering the wide range of potential legal implications of the NEM:ICMA, it is suggested that this legal training course will be very useful for the following categories of persons:

Participants will gain clear understanding of the main provisions of the NEM:ICMA and its key legal implications. The workshop will address the following matters:

- **Introduction and overview of the Act:** purpose, objectives, jurisdictional issues, key definitions and inter-relationships with other environmental statutes.
- **Statutory establishment of a Coastal Zone in South Africa:** definition, composition and related implications.
- **New governance structures for coastal zone management in South Africa:** responsibilities of national, provincial and municipal government, inter-relationships with other government departments and organs of state and associated challenges.
- **Overview of new management and regulatory instruments for the coastal zone and environment:** coastal management programme, estuarine management protocol, "Duty of care" and the coastal environment, coastal notice, repair and removal of notice, coastal planning scheme, coastal lease and concession.
- **EIA for coastal activities:** legal analysis of the relevant provisions and discussion of case studies.
- **Marine and coastal pollution:** regulation of discharge of effluent into coastal waters, prohibition of incineration or dumping at sea and control of activities in coastal waters.

Finally, the workshop will provide the opportunity to network and engage in interactive discussions with the facilitator and the other participants.

Registered participants will have the opportunity to submit questions prior to the workshop which, if applicable and possible, will be addressed during the course of the workshop.

Workshop Hosts and Facilitator

Marie also assisted Professor Glazewski from the University of Cape Town on specific marine pollution related matters, including the development of a "Regional Contingency Plan for the Prevention and Combating of Pollution at Sea by Oil and other Noxious and Hazardous substances", between South Africa, Namibia and Angola and the re-drafting of a course on Marine Control Law. Marie was the project coordinator for the "Hout Bay Harbour Pollution Abatement Project" initiated by the Catchment, Stormwaters and River Management Department of the Metropolitan Council of Cape Town.

Marie is currently busy with her LLD on the regulation of land-based marine pollution in South Africa and France. IMBEWU has also conducted work for the National Ports Authority which required detailed knowledge of the national, regional and international legislation applicable in this context. Marie is also a Para-Legal at Warburton Attorneys.
